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1 Plaintiffs, the People of the State of California and City of Monrovia, are informed
2 and believe, and based upon such information and belief, allege:

3
4 **THE PARTIES**

5 **Plaintiffs:**

6 1. Plaintiffs are the People of the State of California and the City of Monrovia
7 (collectively "Plaintiffs").

8 2. The People of the State of California act by and through Steve Cooley, the
9 District Attorney for the County of Los Angeles. Mr. Cooley is acting under the
10 authority of Code of Civil Procedure ("CCP") section 731 to represent the People of the
11 State of California.

12 3. The City of Monrovia (the "City") is a municipal corporation, duly organized
13 and existing as a general law city under the laws of the State of California, and located in
14 the County of Los Angeles. The City is authorized to bring this action in the name of the
15 People of the State of California under CCP section 731, and Monrovia Municipal Code
16 section 1.16.060 authorizes the City to bring this action in its own name. Defendants, as
17 specifically alleged herein, endanger the public health, safety, and welfare of the
18 residents of the City, as well as other persons from Los Angeles County who frequent the
19 City.

20 4. Jurisdiction of the Court is invoked pursuant to CCP sections 526 and 731 and
21 Civil Code section 3491.

22
23 **Defendants:**

24 5. Defendants, the Monrovia Nuevo Varrio gang, a.k.a. "MNV" or "Monrovia"
25 (hereinafter "MNV"), and the Duroc Crip gang, a.k.a. "Duroc" or "DRC" (hereinafter
26 "Duroc") (collectively "defendants"), are, and at all times mentioned in the Complaint
27 were, unincorporated associations within the meaning of CCP section 369.5 and
28 Corporations Code section 18035, consisting of two or more individuals joined by mutual

1 consent for a common lawful purpose, organized both for profit and social, recreational,
2 and other common purposes. MNV and Duroc act by and through their respective
3 members and conduct their affairs and activities in the City of Monrovia, and
4 unincorporated Los Angeles County area, in the State of California.

5 6. Defendants MNV and Duroc are rivals and each claims gang territory, or
6 “turf,” within the “Safety Zone,” which is described in ¶ 14, *infra* and depicted in Exhibit
7 1 attached hereto.

8 7. Notwithstanding any common lawful purpose, defendant MNV is, and at all
9 times mentioned in this Complaint was, a criminal street gang as defined in Penal Code
10 Section 186.22(f), inasmuch as MNV is a group of three or more individuals with a
11 common name or common symbol and whose members, individually or collectively,
12 engage in or have engaged in a pattern of criminal gang activity giving rise to the public
13 nuisance in the Safety Zone. Gang members from MNV frequently invoke the gang’s
14 name when they commit their criminal and nuisance activities. Members of MNV use
15 their gang’s name to confront, intimidate, and harass individuals who live, work, visit,
16 and pass through the Safety Zone. Because MNV functions under a common name,
17 fairness requires defendant MNV be recognized as a legal entity.

18 8. Defendant MNV is comprised of members including, but not limited to,
19 Vincent Albert Castro (a.k.a. “Vulture”), Niko Delgado (a.k.a. “Necio”), Joshua Robert
20 Ellis (a.k.a. “Ghost”), David Fuentes (a.k.a. “Bouncer”), Uriel Garcia (a.k.a. “Crazy
21 Eyes”), Raul Gardea (a.k.a. “Junebug”), Erik Ibarra (a.k.a. “Stomps”), George Benjamin
22 Lewis (a.k.a. “Trusty” or “Negro”), Michael Lowe (a.k.a. “Peanut”), Brian Paul
23 Magnifico (a.k.a. “Downer” or “Swiftly”), Cesar Anthony Ortiz (a.k.a. “Drowzy”), Edgar
24 Pineda (a.k.a. “Tank”), Gabriel Sanchez (a.k.a. “Lil’ Vago”), Jimmy Santana (a.k.a.
25 “Little Tuffy”), Wilson Andrew Torres (a.k.a. “Drifter”), Rudolfo Vallin (a.k.a.
26 “Knuckles”) and Dexter Paul Williams (a.k.a. “Shadow”) (hereinafter “Designated
27 Representative MNV Gang Members”), each of whom is responsible in some manner for
28 the nuisance described in this Complaint.



1 9. Notwithstanding any common lawful purpose, defendant Duroc is, and at all
2 times mentioned in this Complaint was, a criminal street gang as defined in Penal Code
3 Section 186.22(f), inasmuch as Duroc is a group of three or more individuals with a
4 common name or common symbol and whose members, individually or collectively,
5 engage in or have engaged in a pattern of criminal gang activity giving rise to the public
6 nuisance in the Safety Zone. Gang members from Duroc frequently invoke the gang's
7 name when they commit their criminal and nuisance activities. Members of Duroc use
8 their gang's name to confront, intimidate and harass individuals who live, work, visit, and
9 pass through the Safety Zone. Because Duroc functions under a common name, fairness
10 requires defendant Duroc be recognized as a legal entity.

11 10. Defendant Duroc is comprised of members including, but not limited to,
12 Amber Bastien, Patrick Baston, Ryan Black (a.k.a. "Lil SD"), Nickelis Blackwell (a.k.a.
13 "Black Tone"), Christopher Brown (a.k.a. "Lil Wally"), Deandre Brown, Ricky Dowell
14 (a.k.a. "Du Dirty"), Lawrence Douglas, Harland Fluker Sr., Jonathan Hoskins, Randy
15 Idrell, Lamar McDaniels (a.k.a. "J Loc" or "Peanut"), Brian Moreland (a.k.a. "Snipe"),
16 Ryan Preston, Demetrius Reed Jr., Carl Robinson (a.k.a. "C-Way"), Marquese Scott
17 (a.k.a. "B.D."), Ronald Scott (a.k.a. "P-Nut"), Dupree Simmons, Stanley Simmons (a.k.a.
18 "Bird") and Terence Vanarado (a.k.a. "Half Dead") (hereinafter "Designated
19 Representative Duroc Gang Members"), each of whom is responsible in some manner for
20 the nuisance described in this Complaint.

21 11. Plaintiffs are ignorant of the true names and capacities, whether individual,
22 corporate, or otherwise, of the defendants named herein as Does 1 through 200, inclusive,
23 and plaintiffs therefore sue these defendants by their fictitious names. Plaintiffs will
24 amend this Complaint to state the true names and capacities of each such fictitiously
25 named Defendant when ascertained.

1 weapons, confront, assault, rob, and shoot at individuals. Throughout the Safety Zone,
2 defendants, individually and collectively, vandalize public and private property, trespass,
3 loiter, sell and use narcotics, and drink alcohol on sidewalks, streets, parking lots,
4 apartment complexes and public parks. Defendants' criminal and nuisance behavior is
5 injurious to the health, indecent and offensive to the senses, and an obstruction to the free
6 use of property, so as to interfere with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property by
7 the people who live in, work in, visit and pass through the Safety Zone.

8 16. Defendants MNV and Duroc, through their members, occupy the Safety
9 Zone and by the actions of their members create and maintain a public nuisance therein.
10 Defendants, through their members, have staked out and claim the majority of the City of
11 Monrovia as their "turf." Defendants, individually and collectively, have caused a public
12 nuisance within this "turf," which includes a portion of the County of Los Angeles
13 located south of the City of Monrovia, also included in the Safety Zone. Defendants'
14 members act as if they own the entire City of Monrovia and the portion of the County of
15 Los Angeles and can thereby do whatever they please. The members of MNV and Duroc
16 impact the residents and guests in all areas of the Safety Zone. Shared control over the
17 Safety Zone by members of MNV and Duroc results in a community beleaguered by
18 robberies, assault, regular gunfire, and turf warfare. Defendants' members vandalize
19 with graffiti the streets, schools, homes and other buildings in the Safety Zone.
20 Defendants' members loiter, use drugs, sell drugs, trespass, and intimidate the people
21 who live, work and pass through the Safety Zone.

22 17. Many of the acts committed by members of MNV and Duroc within the
23 Safety Zone constitute a nuisance *per se* under Monrovia Municipal Code section
24 1.16.060, which provides any violation of the MMC shall be deemed a public nuisance
25 and may be abated as such. Defendants, individually and collectively, have committed
26 and do commit numerous municipal code violations including, but not limited to, the
27 following:

28 ///

1 a. Congregating on public streets and sidewalks in such a manner as to
2 obstruct the free passage thereupon of any person or vehicle desiring to use the same, or
3 to assault persons passing along the same (MMC § 9.20.010);

4 b. Drinking alcoholic beverages on any public street, sidewalk, parks, city-
5 owned property or on premises that are open to and maintained for the use and
6 convenience of the public (MMC § 9.12.020);

7 c. Violating curfew restrictions for minors (MMC §§ 9.28.010, 9.28.030);

8 d. Congregating in, on, or near any thoroughfare or place open to the public
9 for the purpose of engaging in drug-related activity (MMC § 9.60.010);

10 e. Discharging firearms within city limits (MMC § 9.36.010); and

11 f. Causing graffiti that can be seen from the public right-of-way (MMC §§
12 8.12.030(23) and 9.62.070).

13 18. In addition to these violations, MNV and Duroc, individually and
14 collectively, use the sidewalks, public parks and private residences to congregate, drink
15 alcohol, use drugs, sell drugs, and harass pedestrians. Members of MNV and Duroc use,
16 possess, and sell illegal narcotics including methamphetamine and marijuana. To carry
17 out their drug sales, members of MNV and Duroc frequently congregate in public areas.
18 Defendants' members have been arrested in the Safety Zone for violating Health and
19 Safety Code Section 11378 (possession for the purpose of sales of methamphetamine),
20 Section 11351 (possession for the purpose of sales of a controlled substance), Section
21 11359 (possession for the purpose of sale of marijuana), Section 11350 (possession of a
22 controlled substance) and Section 11377 (possession of methamphetamine). These
23 activities are not only illegal and dangerous, but are also indecent and offensive to the
24 senses. The "illegal sale of controlled substances" is deemed a nuisance pursuant to Civil
25 Code section 3479.

26 19. MNV and Duroc, individually and collectively, arm themselves with guns,
27 knives, and other dangerous weapons to stake out and claim parts of the Safety Zone as
28 their "turf" and to assert dominance over one another and other rival gangs. They engage

1 violent, aggressive, and destructive behavior, which is egregious to the health and safety
2 of the community and the Safety Zone. Residents are prisoners and victims of MNV and
3 Duroc's wars against rival gangs, including one another, and the foreseeable retaliation
4 by rival gangs against members of MNV and Duroc. Members of MNV and Duroc
5 demonstrate a blatant disregard for the lives and safety of innocent victims by engaging
6 in shootings in the Safety Zone. MNV and Duroc members fire upon one another, upon
7 other gang rivals and upon members of opposite races in the community. Bullets, shell
8 casings, and loaded firearms have been found throughout the Safety Zone. Residents
9 hear shots fired in the night, and live in fear of shootings and random violence breaking
10 out at any moment on the street, sidewalks, and local parks in their neighborhood. The
11 violent acts of MNV and Duroc have endangered residents' lives and have shattered their
12 sense of peace and security in their homes and neighborhoods.

13 20. MNV and Duroc commit graffiti vandalism to further demonstrate each
14 gang's claim on the Safety Zone. MNV and Duroc use graffiti to proclaim their
15 ownership of the Safety Zone, to bolster each gang's notoriety and to physically degrade
16 the Safety Zone. This visual blight acts as a consistent reminder to the community, to
17 rival gang members, and to anyone venturing into the Safety Zone, that MNV and Duroc
18 claim the neighborhood. The graffiti and etchings intimidate and serve as a threat to
19 residents to dissuade them from complaining to law enforcement. The graffiti also
20 notifies residents, rival gangs, law enforcement officers, and any other perceived enemy,
21 the marked area is the "turf" of either MNV or Duroc, and wherever graffiti appears it is
22 a sign to that rival gangs should "keep out." The property rights of the owners and their
23 tenants are substantially impaired and interfered with because they are forced to
24 repeatedly expend time, labor, and money in a vain attempt to eradicate defendants' gang
25 graffiti. It is injurious to the health of the residents, and the quiet enjoyment of their
26 property is harmed and impaired because MNV and Duroc gang graffiti attracts
27 foreseeable and violent retaliation between defendants (who are rival street gangs) or
28 from other street gangs.



1 21. The property rights of owners and tenants within the Safety Zone are
2 further injured by the fact defendants treat the homes and yards of the residents in the
3 Safety Zone as if they were the personal property of their respective gangs. MNV and
4 Duroc trespass in the yards of residents to mark their graffiti on walls, sheds, and other
5 private property. They use the yards of residents as escape routes when fleeing from
6 pursuing law enforcement officers. When being sought by law enforcement, gang
7 members burst into residents' homes to demand shelter. Members of MNV and Duroc
8 substantially impair and interfere with the private possessory rights of the residents and
9 their property. The behavior of defendants' members obstructs the free use of property
10 by the owners and their tenants in the Safety Zone.

11 22. Members of MNV and Duroc, respectively, join together for the lawful
12 purpose of socialization and recreation with friends and family members. When these
13 gatherings are limited to private spaces, out of public view, such as inside a home with
14 permission of the homeowner, they do not necessarily or immediately harm anyone.
15 However as soon as the members of either gang move into public view, such as in yards,
16 streets, parks, and other areas open to public view in the Safety Zone, they intimidate the
17 community, attract violence and act with aggression towards the people who live, work,
18 visit and pass through the Safety Zone. The public social gatherings also lead the
19 members of MNV and Duroc to commit crimes of opportunity by permitting them to pray
20 upon passers-by and other random victims.

21 23. Members of MNV and Duroc loiter, use drugs, sell drugs, drink alcohol,
22 threaten, assault, and rob residents on the streets, sidewalks, local parks, outside local
23 businesses and apartment complexes, and on other property open to public view
24 throughout the Safety Zone. Defendants' members congregate in parks, on the streets,
25 and in residents' yards in the Safety Zone, thereby obstructing the free use of property by
26 the visitors and residents of the Safety Zone. Law abiding people are forced to stay
27 indoors to avoid being harassed by MNV and/or Duroc gang members, and to avoid
28 becoming a victim, or witness to, the criminal and nuisance activities of either gangs'

1 members. The public association of MNV and Duroc's respective members and
2 subsequent victimization of the residents by the gangs' members is injurious to the
3 health, is offensive to the senses, and interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of life
4 and property in the Safety Zone.

5 24. MNV and Duroc's public association also brought, and brings, a threatening
6 atmosphere into the Safety Zone. Defendants, respectively, flaunt their gang tattoos,
7 throw their gang hand signs, and brandish their gang name publicly as a means of
8 terrorizing and intimidating the community. While committing crimes, MNV and Duroc
9 gang members invoke their respective gang names as a weapon and as a warning to the
10 victims. To ensure their criminal and nuisance activities continue unabated, members of
11 MNV and Duroc threaten victims and witnesses and thus avoid prosecution for their
12 conduct. If the members of MNV or Duroc believe a victim or witness has reported a
13 crime, the gangs' members will invoke their name and retaliate against the witness or
14 victim. MNV and Duroc invoke their gang name as a shield to dissuade others from
15 reporting their actions. As a result, law-abiding residents in the Safety Zone rightly
16 believe they are at risk if they report a crime, and law enforcement is prevented from
17 functioning as it should when victims and witnesses, including those witnesses who
18 themselves are committing crimes, are too afraid of retaliation from defendants' members
19 to speak to the police and prosecutors. The fear and intimidation perpetrated by MNV
20 and Duroc allows the gangs' members to commit crimes unchecked. This intimidation
21 causes a nuisance by depriving the community members of their comfortable enjoyment
22 of life and property, and by creating an atmosphere that is injurious to the community's
23 health and welfare.

24 25. MNV and Duroc commit much of their respective criminal, nuisance and
25 gang activity under the cover of darkness. Nuisance activity ranging from illegal drug
26 use and drinking in public, to robberies, assault, shootings, carrying weapons, vandalism
27 and burglary, to driving a vehicle without the consent of the owner, reckless driving and
28

1 driving under the influence, are all most likely to occur in the evening and early morning
2 hours.

3 26. As a result of the behavior of members of MNV and Duroc, many residents,
4 employees, and visitors in the Safety Zone have suffered and suffer great emotional
5 distress. Their days are filled with fear, intimidation, anxiety, and quite often an invasion
6 of privacy. Some residents are forced to stay inside their homes, especially at night.
7 Unless restrained by this Court, MNV and Duroc, and their respective members, will
8 continue to maintain the nuisance by participating in and encouraging the criminal and
9 nuisance activities alleged herein.

10 27. Plaintiffs have no plain, speedy, or adequate remedy at law. Criminal
11 prosecution has not stopped defendants' criminal and nuisance activities. Defendants
12 silence victims and witnesses to their respective crimes with threats of retaliation; thereby
13 reinforcing defendants' reputation, avoiding prosecutions for criminal conduct, and
14 ensuring the nuisance will continue unabated. Defendants threaten basic public order by
15 the oppressive and widespread witness intimidation. Moreover, members of MNV and
16 Duroc released after serving sentences for their crimes, return to their gang's turf and
17 resume their illegal activities. Traditional law enforcement methods have not eliminated
18 the immediate and continual risk to the lives and property of the people who live in, work
19 in, visit, and pass through the Safety Zone.

20 28. Unless restrained by this Court, members of MNV and Duroc will continue
21 to arm themselves and engage in violent activities in the Safety Zone. Defendants'
22 conduct will continue to cause great and irreparable injury to the community.
23 Community members in the Safety Zone are and will continue to be victimized by
24 defendants' murders, assaults, robberies, harassment, and threats.

25 29. Unless restrained by this Court, members of MNV and Duroc will continue
26 to confront and intimidate victims. They will dissuade victims and witnesses from
27 reporting crimes and nuisance behavior to the police, from testifying after reports are
28 made, and thereby evade responsibility for their criminal conduct. Defendants'

1 oppressive and widespread victim and witness intimidation threaten the public interest in
2 tranquility, security, and basic public order.

3 30. Unless restrained by this Court, members of MNV and Duroc will continue
4 to vandalize property in the Safety Zone.

5 31. Unless restrained by this Court, members of MNV and Duroc will continue
6 to congregate in public places and obstruct the public's free enjoyment of those places, in
7 particular, public parks and meeting-places.

8 32. Unless restrained by this Court, members of MNV and Duroc will continue
9 to sell drugs, drink alcohol, and ingest illegal drugs in public.

10 33. The activities and conduct of MNV and Duroc and their respective members,
11 as alleged in this Complaint, constitute an interference with the rights of the community
12 at large in the Safety Zone, and as a result, constitute a public nuisance. The peace,
13 safety and quiet enjoyment of the life and property by community members in the Safety
14 Zone are being, and will continue to be, disturbed and threatened unless equitable relief
15 in the form of an injunction as prayed for against defendants is granted.

16
17 WHEREFORE, plaintiffs pray for judgment against defendants MNV and Duroc,
18 as follows:

19 1. For a judicial determination that defendants MNV and Duroc are
20 unincorporated associations within the meaning of Code of Civil Procedure 369.5 and
21 Corporations Code 18035;

22 2. For a judicial determination that defendants MNV and Duroc are each a
23 criminal street gang within the meaning of Penal Code 186.22, subdivision (f);

24 3. For a judicial determination that a public nuisance within the meaning of Civil
25 Code sections 3479 and 3480 exists in the Safety Zone (depicted in Exhibit 1), located
26 within the City of Monrovia and County of Los Angeles within a boundary that begins at
27 Foothill Boulevard and Fifth Avenue, and goes south along Fifth Avenue to Duarte Road,
28 then east along Duarte Road to Peck Road, then south along Peck Road to Live Oak

1 Avenue, then northeast along the wash that is begins east of South Myrtle Avenue to
2 Mountain Avenue, then north along Mountain Avenue to Huntington Drive, then east
3 along Huntington Drive to Sierra Terrace, then north along Sierra Terrace to Royal Oaks
4 Drive, then west along Royal Oaks Drive to Mountain Avenue, then north along
5 Mountain Avenue to Foothill Boulevard, then west along Foothill Boulevard to the
6 starting point at Fifth Avenue, and extending 100 yards to the outside of the boundary
7 streets.

8 4. For a judicial determination that defendant MNV, its members, including but
9 not limited to, the individuals listed as "Designated Representative MNV Gang
10 Members" are responsible for creating and maintaining the public nuisance in the Safety
11 Zone;

12 5. For a judicial determination that defendant Duroc, its members, including but
13 not limited to, the individuals listed as "Designated Representative Duroc Gang
14 Members" are responsible for creating and maintaining the public nuisance in the Safety
15 Zone;

16 6. For a permanent injunction enjoining and restraining MNV and Duroc, all of
17 their respective members, including but not limited to the individuals listed as
18 "Designated Representative MNV Gang Members" and "Designated Representative
19 Duroc Gang Members" in paragraphs 8 and 10, and all persons acting under, in concert
20 with, for the benefit of, at the direction of, or in association with them or any of them,
21 from engaging in or performing directly or indirectly, any of the following activities in
22 the Safety Zone:

23 a. **Do Not Associate:** Standing, sitting running, walking, driving, gathering
24 or appearing anywhere in public view or anyplace accessible to the public, with any other
25 known member of MNV or Duroc. This prohibition for association shall not apply to the
26 following situations: (1) when all individuals are inside a school attending class or on
27 school business; (2) when all individuals are inside a church; (3) when all individuals are
28 in a classroom attending a licensed gang or drug intervention program; and (4) when all

1 individuals are attending a formal funeral service at Live Oak Cemetery; provided,
2 however, that this prohibition against associating shall apply to all claims of travel to and
3 from the locations listed in (1) through (4) above;

4 **b. Do Not Intimidate:** Confronting, intimidating, annoying, harassing,
5 threatening, challenging, provoking, assaulting, or battering any person in the Safety
6 Zone;

7 **c. Stay Away From Guns or Dangerous Weapons:** Anywhere in public
8 view, in a public place or in any place accessible to the public or in a vehicle in any
9 public place, (1) possessing any gun, ammunition, or dangerous weapon as defined in
10 Penal Code section 12020, (2) knowingly remaining in the presence of anyone who is in
11 possession of such gun, ammunition or dangerous weapon, or (3) knowingly remaining in
12 the presence of such gun, ammunition or dangerous weapon.

13 **d. Stay Away From Drugs:** Without a prescription, (1) selling, possessing,
14 or using any controlled substance or related paraphernalia, including but not limited to,
15 rolling papers and pipes used for illegal drug use, (2) knowingly remaining in the
16 presence of anyone selling, possessing, or using any controlled substance or such related
17 paraphernalia, or (3) knowingly remaining in the presence of any controlled substance or
18 such related paraphernalia;

19 **e. Stay Away From Alcohol:** Anywhere in any public place, public view or
20 anyplace accessible to the public, except on properly licensed premises, (1) possessing an
21 open container of an alcoholic beverage, (2) knowingly remaining in the presence of
22 anyone possessing an open container of an alcoholic beverage, or (3) knowingly
23 remaining in the presence of an open container of an alcoholic beverage;

24 **f. Do Not Vandalize or Possess Graffiti Tools:** Damaging, defacing, or
25 marking any public property or private property of another, or possessing any spray paint
26 can, felt tip marker or other graffiti tool as defined in Penal Code section 594.2.

27 **g. Do Not Trespass:** Being present on or in any property, or running through
28 any property not open to the general public, except (1) with the prior written consent of the



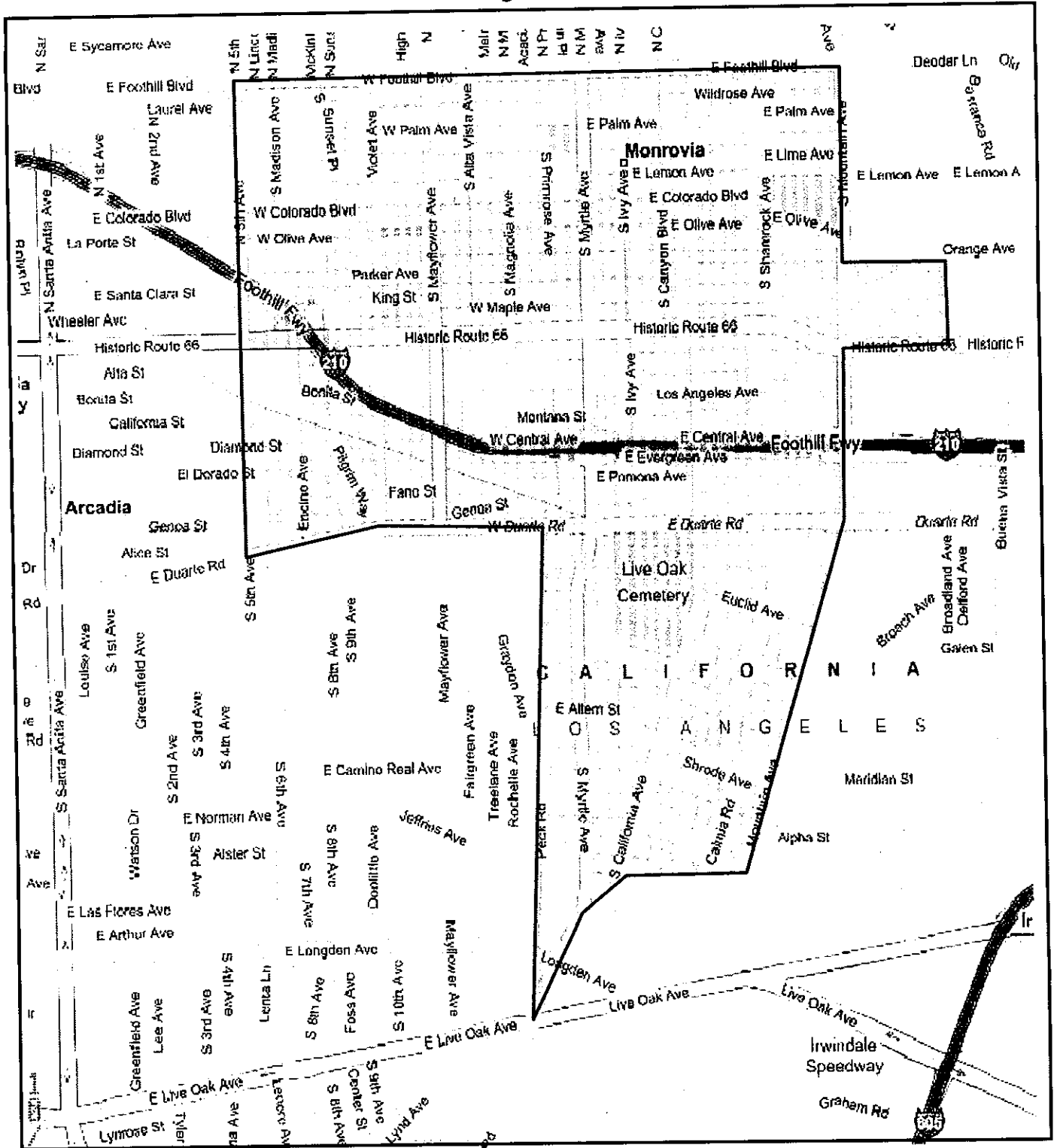
